Financial Aid/Student Payments Freshman Year: Awareness and Assessment Register with your campus Career Center for internship and job listings, oncampus interviews and other opportunities. ☐ Meet with a career counselor to identify career options and concerns. ☐ Take assessments such as Sigi3, Career Exploration Inventory, Myers Brigg, etc. to identify skills, interests, values and personality preferences in making your career decision. Use your undergraduate catalog or website to research majors. ☐ Meet with your advisor to discuss your interests and possible academic paths (majors, minors, study abroad, etc.). Get involved with volunteer experiences, internships or summer jobs. ☐ Job shadow professionals in the work force whenever possible. ☐ Meet with your career counselor to start building your resume and attend career and job fairs. Sophomore Year: Exploration Update your resume with any summer experiences (jobs, internships, etc.) and meet with your career counselor for a review. Attend career fairs and gather information; apply for internships and/or parttime jobs. Get involved with student organizations and professional associations related to your intended career field (or, if you are undecided, to explore careers or fields you might be interested in). ☐ Meet with your advisor regarding your major and the requirements for fulfilling your major. ☐ Meet with the study abroad department to determine if an exchange program experience is right for you and your intended major (Note: Some programs, like

nursing or engineering, do not always have room built in for abroad experiences during the academic year).

Junior Year: Test Drive Careers and Gain Experience	
	Work with a career counselor to refine your resume and cover letter, and develop job search and interviewing skills.
	Determine if graduate school or professional school would be required or extremely beneficial in helping you reach your career goals. (Note: Some graduate programs, such as a MBA, strongly prefer or require several years of work experience in order to apply.)
	Practice interviewing and learn about professional attire, mannerisms and overall behavior.
	Get involved in student organizations and professional associations by serving in leadership roles.
	Participate in events and work experiences that will help you build on your skill sets.
	Continue to attend career fairs.
Senior Year: Job Search and Transition	
	Practice interviewing through mock interviews, either through your campus career center or with former employers/mentors.
	Create a profile on LinkedIn; make sure you have nothing inappropriate on your Facebook page or any other web-based networking sites.
	Meet with a career counselor to tailor your resume and cover letter to each position that you are interested in.
	Update your resume with internships, jobs and other related experiences. Apply for jobs now! You don't have to wait until graduation to apply for a full-time position.
	Attend career fairs.
